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"The 411 on Group Riding with the Chapter!"

As the Chapter gets larger and larger, so will our group rides. Which is a good problem for us to have! Some of the new members that we get coming into the Chapter are new riders and have never been on group rides. Because of this, they may be a bit overwhelmed and scared of riding in groups. Well I'm here to tell you that there is no sweat about it, except maybe in July or August! Below I've put a brief explanation to hopefully ease the mind of any members that are timid about riding with the Chapter. When my wife started riding with the Chapter, in the beginning she felt pressured like she had to ride at the skill level of everyone on the ride. I kept telling her to ride her own ride, and ride within her comfort zone. It wasn't until she realized that, that she was able to relax so much and really enjoy herself on rides. Now she's ridden all the way to the Smoky Mountains and slayed the Tail of the Dragon, Twice!!!

The first thing that you want to do is to arrive prepared. In other words, arrive on time with a full tank of gas. Ride in formation is a very important element of group riding with the Chapter. The staggered riding formation allows a proper space cushion between motorcycles so that each rider has enough time and space to maneuver and to react to hazards. The leader rides in the left third of the lane, while the next rider stays at least one second behind in the right third of the lane; the rest of the group follows the same pattern. A single-file formation is preferred on a curvy road, under conditions of poor visibility or poor road surfaces, entering/leaving highways, or other situations where an increased space cushion or maneuvering room is needed. Avoid side-by-side formations, as they reduce the space cushion. If you suddenly needed to swerve to avoid a hazard, you would not have room to do so. You don't want handlebars to get entangled.

A group will consist of a lead, a sweep, and (usually) a rider(s) in the middle with CB radios. If the groups are too large, we will break up into multiple groups. When we need to change lanes; the lead bike will call back to the sweep to grab either the right or left lane. Once the sweep has the lane secured, he will call ahead and the whole group will change lanes. Periodically check the riders following in your rear view mirror to see if the group is getting over. If you see a rider falling behind, maintain formation because a road captain is with him and the lead knows what is going on. If you're separated from the riders in front of you, don't panic. There is a road captain behind you with a CB, you will not get left behind. Don't break the law or ride beyond your skills to catch up. If the group comes upon a situation, say making a left turn; The group will make the left turn when traffic allows. If you get stopped at a red light or by traffic, you make the turn when YOU feel safe. Don't get nervous and feel rushed, you will not get left behind.

Where the phrase comes from; "Ride your own ride!". Which basically means that while the Chapter's first priority on rides is Safety and the road captains are always looking out for the other riders. You need to watch out for yourself as well, and ride within your skill & comfort zone.

Each HOG Chapter has a Safety Officer, the Northshore Chapter's is Russ Davis. If you have any questions about any of this information or anything pertaining to our rides. Please don't feel silly about asking Russ, or any Chapter Officer any questions that you may have so that you fully understand. Remember, we were all new riders at some point.

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From the Director


A word from your Director, Dan "Byucop" Schewe
