BOURBON & CIGARS II

Ever wonder why we ride?? If it's just a short ride of 100 miles or a longer ride of, say 1600 miles, it's for the pure enjoyment of the open road! The last Bourbon and Cigar ride was cut short due to weather so, it's only fitting that the ride continues! After all, there are MORE distilleries to visit!

The return to the Bourbon mecca of Bardstown Kentucky was planned and reservations were made. Chris Engelbracht, Dave Authement, Greg Peterman and I all met at the truck stop in Slidell to begin our trek and the return to the Bourbon capitol of the world on September 11th. As we departed Slidell we headed north to Meridian MS and then onto Tupelo MS. Leaving Tupelo we picked up the Natchez trace to Florence AL for our first night. The second day we continued northeast through Tennessee and Kentucky and into Bardstown. The days were sunny and reasonably cool and the roads were beautiful. On arrival in Bardstown it was time for some Bourbon and cigars and then off on a walking tour of downtown and a visit to the Oscar Getz museum to learn more about prohibition and moonshine. Planning our next day was done at the hotel and we all agreed to start out early so we could get in a full day of tours and tastings!

If you are wondering, it really is the Bourbon capitol because, you see, the water in the area is the key to the best Bourbon. Did you know that 98% of all Bourbon distilleries are in the central Kentucky region? Bourbon is a type of distilled spirit made primarily from corn. Bourbon was named after its place of origin, Bourbon County, in the bluegrass region of Kentucky. Each distillery has its own unique recipe; each bourbon-making process follows similar guidelines. It begins with the iron-free, calcium-rich limestone water. From there, yeast, corn, rye and barley are added. The different distilleries have their own "special" yeast and it is a guarded recipe. The head distiller would take the yeast home with him to protect it from other distillers in years gone by. The mixture, or sour mash, is cooked and fermented. This creates a clear liquid known as "White Dog" or moonshine.

After the whiskey making process, the liquid is placed in new, white oak charred barrels and are only used once. The barrels are then sold to Scotland for scotch whiskey. The barrels are stored in rick houses that are all over the country side of Bardstown area.

As the season change, the white oak barrels expand and contract. The whiskey traps caramelized sugars, flavor and color from the barrel. Then the whiskey matures (ages) for anywhere from four (4) to twenty seven (27) years!

For whiskey to be labeled bourbon it MUST:

- Be produced in the United States,
- Contain natural grains in which 51% is corn,
- Be distilled at less than 160 proof from fermented grain mash, or 80% alcohol,
- Be matured in NEW charred white oak barrels at no more than 125 proof,

- Not have anything added to the final product to alter the flavor or the color from the time it is distilled through the bottling except water, and

• Be bottled at 80 proof or higher.

Now that you have an idea of how it's all done, you need to know that there are 11 distilleries within riding distance of Bardstown. They also have a Bourbon festival every year. This year was just after our visit to the area.

Barrel-Shaped Tasting Room at Heaven Hill

Our tour began on Tuesday, September 11 in the AM, as we traveled to the Jim Beam distillery. We left early to get started on a full day of tours. The Beam distillery was very informative. Did you know that the recipe for beam has been handed down from 7 generations? In 2005, Frederick Booker Noe III, the great grandson of Jim Beam, filled the 10 millionth barrel of Jim Beam bourbon! Now I know who made that bottle of "BOOKER" I have in my bar and why it's named Booker. Today, the Jim Beam Co. is the second largest distilled spirits company in the US. After a tour and a "taste" of Jim Beam it was off to Heaven Hill but before our departure we encountered some tourists from Germany that wanted to take our pictures on our Harleys.

At the Heaven Hill distillery as we parked in the parking area, a guide from inside came out to greet us and see if we wanted to hurry in and join the tour group just starting. "Of course" we all responded and off to the theater we went. After watching a movie and with some instruction from our tour guide, we started out on the tour. The tour guide explained that the Heaven Hill distillery is the nation's largest, family-owned, independent producer and marketer of distilled spirit products. It was begun in December of 1935. In their warehouses they have more than 1,000,000 charred white oak barrels of aging bourbon. It was amazing to see how many different brands that the Heaven Hill distilleries put out. After the tour they put us into the heritage center and in the center of it there is a barrel shaped tasting room that can seat 20 people. Ever heard of Evan Williams or Elijah Craig? They are all products of Heaven Hill.



Saddle up and off to the Makers Mark distillery. Makers Mark holds a fond place in my heart because I am an Ambassador and have a barrel of whiskey, with my name on it, in one of their storage houses that will be ready next year! Makers Mark started in 1780 and today makes and distributes more than 1,000,000 cases each year. During the tour we got to see vats of fermenting whiskey in their still house. These are giant cypress vats that each holds 9600 gallons of sour mash. We were allowed to put our finger in and taste the mash! From there we toured the bottling facility and watched the bottles being filled with that golden colored liquid. From there we got to watch the dipping process
