Harley History – The Sixties

The 1960 ushers in a new era not only for the country but for Harley Davidson. The Fab-4 arrive from England and take the US music scene by storm. Meanwhile, the company founded by another Fab-4 (Walter, William, and Arthur Davidson along with William Harley) enters into a turbulent period of new challenges and diversification.

1960 – Harley Davison purchases a half interest in Aeronatica-Macchi and forms Aermacchi Harley-Davidson. The new company will produce a small single cylinder engine to compete with the metric invasion from England and Japan. The motor company also introduces the Topper motor scooter.

1961 – The first Aermacchi Sprint is released as an initial 165cc and then released in 1962 as a 250cc model.

1962 – HD becomes 60% owner of the Tomahawk Boat Manufacturing Company recognizing the increasing popularity of fiberglass components for motorcycles.

1964 – Roger Reiman wins the AMA Grand National Championship and Daytona 200 riding a 750KR. **1965** – The Duo-Glide gets an electric starter and now is called the Electra-Glide soon to be known as the "King of Highway." This familiar name would later surface on one Harley Davidson's best seller, the Road King. The company is suffering from a poor cash flow and starts selling shares on the public market. The founding family members hold on to 53% of the common shares but a hostile takeover is orchestrated by Bangor Punta financial group.

1966 – The Shovelhead engine is introduced on the Electra-Glide models, replacing the Pan Head.

1968 – This year 26,600 motorcycles were sold however only little more than 15,000 were American made. In a desperate attempt to ward off the Bangor group, William Davidson approaches long-time friend and CEO of AMF about a merger.

1969 – The movie Easy Rider is released and Harley-Davidson mergers with American Machine and Foundry Company.

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South Padre Island "SPI Bike Fest" 2004

For my fellow HOG Members, another synopsis of a regional bike rally for you to digest. SPI Bike Fest is a "laidback" type of rally. It attracts about 10,000 bikers and most of the vendors have just finished Daytona and are headed back to California. It is a great intermediate stop on their way back to West Coast events. Food was reasonable, hotels were cheap, and the either this year was great. No rain, temps in the 70-85 range; always a welcome shore breeze. A warning...weather can be tricky in southern Texas...come prepared for both hot/cold extremes... and bring your rain gear always! You will see para-sailors, stunt planes, and lots of boats. Charter boats are a big deal and the fishing is very close to Louisiana standards. Bring your swim suit because the water is warm, clean, and inviting. Over a hundred miles of virgin beach to explore. Sunrises and sunsets are awesome. There is an organized trip to a Mexico border town. This year about 800 bikers rode to Nuevo Progresso. You can just as easily go your own way too. Bring ID. No passport/visa is required....just don't bring back farm products, Cuban tobacco, or prescription drugs. Leave your guns locked in a safe place for this trip because the Mexican authorities are still a little sensitive about our 1812 conflict. A liter of Tequila (or your favorite alcoholic beverage) is allowed per person. There were no border hassles.

The trip is about 760 miles, most of which is Interstate (12 & 10) as you travel from Slidell, Louisiana. Ride or trailer, both are used by SPI participants. SPI Bike Fest is held annually the 2d - 3rd week of October. I started my 2004 trip about 7:00 am. Day one was an early launch up I-12 west. Traffic "thinned" as I passed Baton Rouge and it was a smooth ride and a short visit to Cajun Harley Davidson in Lafayette. Next "breather" was Cowboy Harley Davidson in Beaumont, Texas. The entire trip is flat, straight road and can get boring quickly, so the stops were a welcome break. As I approached Houston, I took the I-610 loop south until it intersects State Road 59 South (west

side of Houston). The Sam Houston Tollway (8) has less traffic but costs a few \$. By taking I-610, you can stop at Stubb's Harley Davidson just off Telegraph Road (north) a few miles past the I-45 interchange. After pushing through the city, I continued down State Road 59. My kidneys said stop so I spent the night in a little town called Rosenberg-Richmond just southwest of Houston. You've got to get out of the city if you want to prevent delays on the next day's leg of the trip. Morning traffic in Houston is a bear...avoid it at all cost.

Day two was six hours of flat, open Texas cattle country. SR 59 has wide, slow curves (left then right) that meander south past Victoria, Corpus Christi, and Kingsville. State and local police actively patrol Victoria to Brownsville so keep it legal. As you approach Brownsville you experience lots of congestion/ construction and you still have an hour to go before you get to South Padre. Between Brownsville and South Padre Island is the Matamoros Bridge. Warning...occasionally, the wind just "rips" through this waterway so bike or trailer..."SLOW-DOWN." After crossing the Bridge there is only one main road on the island (you won't get lost). To the left are most of the hotels and about 2-3 miles up is the Convention Center. Venders, registration, daily entertainment, etc. are located there. If you take a right as you travel onto the Island, you will very quickly enter the Schlitterbahn Beach Water Park. Along with Budweiser, they sponsor this event. The Water Park is drained and closed, but the headline entertainment is held on this site. Three Dog Nite was the Top Bill for the 2004 Bike Fest and was exceptional.
