## Random Thoughts and Road Hazards

### AVOIDING GREMLINS & MINIMIZING RISKS BY DAN WEHR

By the time you receive this newsletter, I'll be well on my way to California for a long tour of the southwestern states. A key component of preparation for this trip was a close inspection of my scooter to check for any possible mechanical issues that could adversely impact my enjoyment of the journey.

I have always followed the Motorcycle Safety Foundation's "T-CLOCS" pre-ride checklist. This acronym stands for Tires and wheels, Controls and cables, Lights, Oil and fuel, Chassis, and Sidestand.

Tires and Wheels are probably the most important items to inspect. Make sure tire pressure is up to specs, the treads are at least 1/16<sup>th</sup> of an inch high, and there are no cracks, cuts, or deep scratches in the rubber. Check for loose spokes by striking them. If you do not get a clear ping, they need tightening and your rims may need truing. For alloy wheels, check for dented, nicked or chipped rims.

Controls/Cables. A loose shifter lever, broken throttle or clutch cable will stop you cold. Check all cable controls making sure they operate freely without binding. Check the operation of your brakes and ensure fluid levels for both master cylinders are at appropriate levels.

Lights. Switch on the ignition and ensure your headlight, driving lights, running lights, tail lights, brake lights, turn signals, and horn are operational. Replace any bulbs, fuses, or relays if necessary. If your battery is more than two-years-old, check its resting and fully charged output. If it's less than 12.3 volts, replace it.

Oil and fuel levels should be checked before departure. I always set my trip meter when I fill up. While I have a gas gage, it is does not accurately indicate my tank's fuel level. This is critical, especially in the more remote areas of our country where gas stations can be scarce. I also check my oil level at the end of each day while the engine is hot. My old Evo uses about a quart every 2,500 miles. My Ultra uses hardly any.

Chassis. Ensure your suspension is properly calibrated for the load you will be carrying. Some bikes require manual adjustments of the rear shock springs, others are adjusted by air pressure. Your owner's manual will tell you what to do.

Sidestand. Check the stand for any cracks or distortions. Inspect the spring to ensure it is in place and not damaged and has sufficient tension to hold the stand in place. If not done at the regular maintenance of your bike, put a shot of grease in the pivot/receiver.

This pre-ride check list can save you unexpected interruptions and grief while on the road.

### The Mecca of Harley History Terry Forrette – Historian


If you have ever wondered where the legendary Number One, 1903 model is kept or where you would go to see the original issue of the Enthusiast Magazine, the answer is the Corporate Archives in Milwaukee. For most HD riders questions like this can't hold a candle to the thrill of a group ride, but for many of us "FLHHN's" (Fanatical Harley History Nuts) this is the stuff that makes our pipes rumble. The Corporate Archives are maintained in Building 11 or the "Old P&A Building" on Juneau Avenue. The building itself has its own history, first constructed in 1913 to house various manufacturing machines and then later becoming the assembly area for the 125, 165, and 175 cc two-stroke engines. The Archives moved into the fourth floor of Building 11 in July 1977. Occupying 16,000 square feet it is divided into several distinct areas. Security is strict and access is limited even to HD employees, with much of the Archives on a "need to know and see" basis. There are four full-time restorers as well as an intern from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee who work in the archives. When the new HD Museum opens the archives will be getting a new home at that time.

In one section is a huge collection of nearly priceless artifacts stored on rows of steel racks. This area is climate controlled at a constant 70 degrees and 45 percent relative humidity (not a bad place to visit during a typical Louisiana summer!). It houses 100,000 original documents, posters, service manuals, and accessory catalogs dating back to 1903. Rows upon rows of HD clothing, jewelry, belts, and foot gear can be found here. Many of the ideas for "retro" looking gear are researched here.

Another set of steel doors opens to the Restoration Room. Here specialists preserve elements of original motorcycles making sure paint, plating and parts are kept in their original state. Dozens of engines can be seen in this area, ranging from Knuckleheads, VR1000 race engines, to TC88's. The vintage vehicle collection contains 10 vintage HD bicycles; five golf carts, three scooters and even a HD snowmobile (wonder what the 10K service would cost on that baby?).

Continuing on through the Archives leads you to a section that contains a collection of motorcycles that represent models produced by HD starting with the 1903 Number One all the way up to the 2008 Screaming Eagle editions. Contained in the collection are prototypes never released for general sales, special military editions designed at the request of the U.S. Army during World Wars I and II, and also rare models such as those build in Japan prior to World War II.

While I have never visited the Corporate Archives in Milwaukee, I did get a chance to view many of items contained in them at the Dallas Open Road Tour, the 100<sup>th</sup> Celebration in Milwaukee last August and I am sure they will have an updated on at the 105 Celebration this year.. To look back into time and see the origins of motorcycling in the early days of Harley Davidson is just one of the many things that make being a Harley Davidson rider and a member of H.O.G. so rewarding.

#### HEAD ROAD CAPTAIN TROY HORD'S ROAD TIPS.

When riding alone, as in one motorcycle. There are a number of suggestions I can make that have proven to reduce the chances of another vehicle hitting you. Always ride in the tracks of the multi-wheel vehicles on the road. If you ride the middle of the lane like many bikers choose to do, you are going to pick up a nail or hit some sort of debris in the road. The four wheel vehicles run over all the debris in the tracks and it gets moved to the shoulder or to the middle of the lane. You never see any trash in the tracks; it is always in the middle of the lane. I like to ride on the left side of the lane I occupy. I see lots of riders on the right side of the lane and when asked why, they say it is more comfortable to be away from on coming traffic. You are far more visible on the left side. If you are on the right side of the lane in heavy traffic on a two lane road and some bone head decides to pass as many cars as he can before he hits an oncoming car he will see an open spot ahead of a car and abruptly turn into it, unbeknownst to him you are in that slot. If, on the other hand, you are on the left of the lane he will see you as he races up the line of vehicles and even more importantly, you will see him approaching.

Ride safe, ride often and always wear appropriate safety gear.
